MR. DUNSAY: Today I'd like to talk about how the psych system sometimes silences mad people. I have a story about one mad activist I know today. Next time I talk, I'll talk about another activist.

This gentleman was an elderly man in

Teaneck who was a candidate on the Libertarian ticket

a couple of years ago. Way back in the Civil Rights

era, he helped racially integrate Los Angeles. Then

he became a professor in Pennsylvania, where he

fought the war on drugs. And he was very good at

knowing the law. He had a knack for challenging local ordinances that were unconstitutional and then getting the judge to strike down the ordinances, after a civil disobedience.

This happened so many times that the local county judge told the police to stop arresting him, because he felt that every time they arrested him, they were wasting the judge's time.

Now, when he moved to Bergen County, he also became active in the political process, and, you know, he was rather bold in his activism, and some people found this disturbing. And there's a saying in the mad movement that people don't get hospitalized for being disturbed, they get hospitalized for being disturbing. When the neighbors don't like what someone is doing, but it's not technically against the law, they often rely on cops to bring them to a hospital like Bergen Regional where he can get locked up without any charges being pressed.

Every time he came out of the hospital, he would say in his own words to me that they "tortured" him there. Eventually, they basically silenced him. He's not an activist anymore. And I think you should know how the system treats an old

1 man who had a long history of fighting the good cause but got silenced by the medical community. 2 3 Thank you. 4 CHAIRMAN SULLIVAN: Thank you. 5 Kleidon Ndreu. 6 MR. NDREU: I apologize. It's my first 7 Freeholders meeting that I've attended. I'm a senior in high school. And while he was murdered, his voice certainly has not been silenced, and, as we saw, whether it was in the march on the 24th where we saw our young people stepping forward and leading the way in having their voices heard or in the Women's March or in so many of the different opportunities where we had to vocalize our sentiments regarding the way our government should be working his legacy is certainly a powerful one and it underscores tonight how much work there is still to be done.

Just to underscore, as the Chairwoman of the Health Committee, that we have seen a surge in sexually transmitted diseases since 2009, and it is important for us to make sure that we take charge of our health and to erase the stigma associated with testing. We want to make sure that

everyone knows that there are services available,

whether it's through Planned Parenthood or through

the County of Bergen Health Department or through New

Jersey Buddies, we will have the opportunity to get

yourself tested, know your status, and make sure that

you're being pro-active in that regard.

earlier, I'm just so proud of how engaged these kids are. We had over 15 speakers from various high schools throughout the county, and they just want their voices heard. They actually got the "Get out the vote," and really their best weapon right now is their voices and their vote. So I look forward to seeing what's going to come from all this, because I know, like they said, this is a movement, and I'm very proud of them.

We also attended the Human Services

Committee this past week. And although Hurricane

Maria was already over six months ago, Puerto Rico is

still going through a lot now. A lot of homes have

not been repaired, a lot of them are still in

disarray, and I know New Jersey has been really,

especially with the help of the Governor, helping a

lot of Puerto Rico families move to New Jersey and be

able to relocate them here. So I'm very proud of

their work.

They also discussed about the federal budget, of which 80 percent of universal pre-K is coming from the federal budget, which is probably the one and only thing positive coming from the federal budget. So I'm glad, at least it's helping our children.

1 And that concludes my report. 2 you. 3 CHAIRMAN SULLIVAN: Thank you, 4 Chairwoman. Freeholder Voss. 5 FREEHOLDER VOSS: Thank you, Chairman. 6 7 Again, I want to congratulate our 8 Teacher of the Year. Teaching is the most rewarding 9 and wonderful profession. And, as I said, I wish you 10 many, many years and not only in the classroom but 11 perhaps in administration. I am very happy for you. 12 These past two weeks, we were 13 celebrating Passover and Holy Week and Easter, and so 14 everybody was quite busy with the holidays. celebrations for Greek Independence Day and making

people aware of all of the things that they have given to us.

Women's History Month. I'm quite an old lady, and I have lived through times when women were not given very much credibility or status. I remember my first attempt to get a scholarship was to go to Europe to study, and the committee told me, "Sweetheart, we don't give these to women. You're just going to get married and have children and never use it."

Well, you can tell that I'm not a shy person, and I got the scholarship. But things have certainly changed at this point in time, and now more women from college graduate more doctors, more lawyers, and, as you can see, up here we have the majority on the Freeholder Board. Unfortunately this is not the situation on the federal government or even on our state government, but we're making progress. And it's only been since 1988 that we have been given national acknowledgment of the contributions that women have made.

My favorite quote concerning women is from Eleanor Roosevelt, and I use this all the time. Eleanor Roosevelt said, "A woman is like a tea bag, only when she is in hot water do you realize how

1 strong she is."

And on that note I will end it, except this is a very important Martin Luther King Day, the 50th anniversary. He was only 39-years-old when he was assassinated, and the contributions that he made will be forever remembered and hopefully many people will carry on his work in the future.

FREEHOLDER AMOROSO: Many of us

Freeholders attended the March for our Lives protest

right here outside the county courthouse in

Hackensack on March 24th. A number of high school

students spoke out in favor of tougher gun laws and

against the NRA's obstinacy of restrictions that

would make it tougher for shooters to murder students

and others in group settings. The protesting

students said very nicely, "If adults are acting like children in caving to the NRA, then children will have to take the lead and shame the adults," and they're doing that.

Sen. Loretta Weinberg spoke for many of us when she said these protests by young people give her hope for the first time in a long time that we can end or reduce mass shootings of innocence.

Good news from Washington about federal Community Development and HUD grants that help pay for everything from renovations for nonprofits to road repaving in low income neighborhoods. These Community Development funds were on the chopping block, but are now slated to receive increases under the new federal budget. Included in the increases nationally are Community Development Block Grants, the Home Program, homeless assistance grants and public housing capital funds. Bergen County's Community Development Director said Bergen County should receive notice about the monies it can expect for the upcoming year sometime in May.

And, finally, a reminder that the Bergen County Care Fair is only about 30 days away.

We expect to have about 225 exhibitors talking about care services for the young, the old, the differently

abled, and those in need of medical services. The date is Sunday, May 6th, the place is the Rothman

Center at FDU.

That's my report.

CHAIRMAN SULLIVAN: Thank you,

I will start my committee report by reporting on shared services.

Tonight we passed Resolution #252-18.

Our county entered into an agreement with the Board of Social Services, which will bring the county \$25,000 in revenue.

Also, Resolution #265-18 was passed in which the county continues its shared service agreement with the City of Hackensack on adaptive intelligence traffic signaling systems. This is going to be a game changer for our county seat, as far as alleviating traffic congestion. We look forward to the completion of this project.

We could sit here and just pass the bills, go about our merry way and just do nothing, but we continue here to move forward, to be forwardly thinking and continue to enter in as many shared service agreements as we can to save our taxpayers money, and that's what we continue do and that's why

I continue to bring it up every month. I think it's important for the residents to realize that here at One Bergen, everybody is doing their best to alleviate any tax burden, and shared services is where we can get some true savings.

I'm also excited about the prospect of more business coming into Bergen County after a presentation that was made earlier tonight.

BergenforBusiness.com, I was very impressed by the information that the website provides.

In addition, there is another similar project the county has undertaken to assist business and developers with site plan ordinances. And I'm told we'll have more from Planning and Engineering in the coming weeks. So basically what this is is the county has decided after many, many years that it hasn't been done in the past that we're going to make sure that the site plans are proper, our right-of-ways are proper, and everything is put into a new document, so when there's an improvement in any of the towns, the county has the right to make whoever is coming into a new area, we can ask them to make improvements, and it's a way to get other people that want to make the area better, they can pay for the improvements, saving the taxpayers even more

1 money.

So that book is going to be done. I asked them to meet with every Freeholder before we actually bring that forward. It's similar to a codification of ordinances, but on a site plan and right-of-way level.

Which brings me to another thing I want to talk about. I talked to the County Executive and the County Counsel about codifying all our ordinances. This is another thing that hasn't been done. It will make life easier for everybody, if all these ordinances were codified, similar to the site plan. It makes everything easier, makes everything more explainable, and easier for everyone to follow, so I'll be looking to follow through on that. That's a long process, but we'll be looking to do that too.

So I fully support all of these projects the administration has brought forth, and we will work to continue to do what's best to make the county an easier place to navigate.

I want to thank Bob Gordon, a senator who left to take a position in Phil Murphy's cabinet, for his time in the Senate. He was an outstanding senator, he served the county well, and we certainly will miss him.

Also, I want to thank Jared Lautz for all his time working here and Storm for getting a promotion. Tracy, Jared wants to know where his espresso machine is before he leaves. Apparently it went missing, and Tracy is the main culprit here. So hopefully before you go to the next side, Jared, you can take it. But Jared is an extraordinarily hard worker, and that's the kind of people the county likes to see advance, because they really have everyone's best interest at heart.

Everyone has spoken about the assassination of Martin Luther King. All I can say is Freeholder Zur put it best, his job is not done. We should all reflect and realize all the great things that have come out of his loss of life. Unfortunately, he was taken from us way too early, but he's definitely left his mark, and, we, as parents and as adults, need to spread the word to the children so they realize that this is really the way things should be. We thought we had turned a corner, unfortunately there's a lot of hate going on in the world today, and maybe if we just take a step back and listen to some of the words from Dr. Martin Luther King, we can get our boundaries back and realize we need to get back on the right track.
