    Assault Awareness Month, and the YWCA of Bergen

    County houses healingSPACE, a sexual violence
    resource center, which is the statewide resource

    center for sexual violence victims for Bergen County
```

and we are the only service of its kind in Bergen

County. I have with me our program manager, Caitlin,

who will I think say a few words as well. But really

I just wanted to share with you that this is a month

where we have a lot of events and do additional

awareness than we do normally. And obviously we've

been doing this work since the mid '70s, but we know

last fall this work got a lot more present in the

media, and although it wasn't new to us, it's

obviously raised a lot more awareness around us.

With that, and I know many of you know because you were with us last week, we had a press conference with First Lady Tammy Murphy to update the community on a coalition that we launched, the Time is Now Action Coalition, where we put together a support network of community organizations and key individuals to be able to allow individuals in Bergen County who have been sexually harassed or sexually assaulted in the workplace to know that you don't have to be a celebrity to have the community stand with you and that we are working to help eradicate this issue here. We're starting locally, and our plan is to go statewide shortly.

With that, I just want to make sure that people are aware of the statistics, that one in

five women and one in 71 men will be raped at some point in their lives. In the United States, one in three women and one in six men experience some form of sexual contact in their lifetime. In eight out of ten cases of rape, the victim of the perpetrator was actually known to them. And eight percent of rape cases occur while the victim is at work.

The lifetime cost of rape per victim is \$122,461. And rape is the most expensive crime that exists, according to the national statistics, even above assault, murder, and drunk driving.

So it's important that we provide services and support sexual survivors for many reasons. We know a lot of issues that exist. We know there's a lot of conversation about the opioid crisis that happens. We know there's a very high statistic of individuals that they're medicating with drugs because they were sexually assaulted and that is how they are just, you know, managing, because they haven't really been able to address it.

Our organization works closely, obviously, to support the community.

Caitlin, we're hoping, could talk more about healingSPACE in particular.

CHAIRMAN SULLIVAN: Sure.

MS. GEORGE: So, happy Sexual Assault

Awareness Month.

Today just happens to be Denim Day, which is why I'm wearing this button, which is an annual Sexual Awareness Month event that started when a judge in Italy told a sexual assault survivor that she had to have consented to her rape because her jeans were too tight and she must have helped her rapist take off her pants.

We wear denim on this day to support survivors and stop the plaque of victim blaming in this country and all over the world.

Since 2017, and the start of the #MeToo movement, we have seen a surge in numbers from survivors coming forward. We saw a 24 percent increase in counseling and a 54 percent increase in hotline calls in the past year, since actually November of 2017.

We are ecstatic to see more survivors coming forward and telling their stories. This, however, brings me to the segue into the importance for funding and volunteers and just general community awareness of the issue.

We are in need of monetary donations; dignity kits, which are given to survivors when

leaving the hospital after a sexual assault forensic exam is done. Most of the time, the survivors have to leave their clothing for evidence purposes, and need sweatshirts, sweatpants, and other clothing items to return home.

I just want to tell you a little bit about our services at healingSPACE. So, Helen went over that we're Bergen County's only sexual violence resource center. We are a safe and welcoming space for survivors of sexual violence and their loved ones. We have support groups and loved ones' counseling also to help them navigate the trauma of sexual violence and its aftermath. Our crisis intervention hotline is 24 hours a day, seven days a week, and it provides free and confidential assistance.

We have trained advocates who provide individual counseling, facilitate support groups accompanied through medical, legal and other proceedings. And we are out in the community every week raising awareness and educating schools, organizations, workplaces, and among diverse individuals on the front lines of the sexual violence movement.

HealingSPACE also sponsors events

throughout the year to raise community awareness

about sexual violence, and we just were awarded a

legal advocacy grant, our newest program, where we

provide legal advocacy services and access to legal

services to survivors with our partnership with

Northeast New Jersey Legal Services.

About 25 percent of young ladies in college are going to experience, if not more, sexual assault, and I think a lot of it goes unreported, and so it's really greater than what we are aware of.

MS. ARCHONTOU: Absolutely.

FREEHOLDER VOSS: So thank you so much.

MS. ARCHONTOU: As you know, I've spent the last year sitting on the statewide task force of campus sexual violence. We put out a report looking at this issue, specifically around how to address campus sexual assaults. A lot of it does go unreported. There is a lot happening, and so we did put together some formal recommendations throughout the state that the Legislature now is looking at in terms of formalizing, but there's a tremendous amount of education happening with our healingSPACE program locally in all of our colleges and universities here in Bergen County, so you can all feel confident that we are on-site, and speaking to students and working with faculty to make sure that they're engaged and

they're needed. But there's definitely a lot of work

to be done, and, quite frankly, we need to start

younger, all the way in pre-K to explain, you know,

age appropriately to understand these issues so that

there is more of an opportunity and comfort level of

people sharing, if something were to happen, so they

MR. GERHARDT: I'm Peter Gerhardt. I'm the Executive Director of the EPIC School in Paramus, New Jersey. We've been here for 20 years. I consider myself quite lucky to be here today in front of the Board of Chosen Freeholders of Bergen County. I was born in Hackensack Hospital and then my family moved away, so it's always like old home week. I know if my parents were still here, they'd be amazed that I can sit down with you guys. I want to thank you for that opportunity.

I've been working with individuals with autism for 38 years. It makes me a outlier in my field, not that I've done it for 38 years but I worked for 38 years with individuals who are older, adolescents with autism has always been my expertise. And a couple of things I learned along the way is that community matters. And if we say it takes a village to raise a child; with autism, it takes two villages, a small city, a commune, a temple, the Hells Angels, a liquor store. It takes a lot to raise a kid with autism. And in my travels across the country, I don't think there's a more inclusive community than one can find in Bergen County.

I think it makes my job so much easier

that I go out and people know autism, and I don't have to worry about he is doing something that looks a little bit odd, because everybody knows, and the people around him know his name, and it's not just by his disability. And I think that that's just indicative of what it's like to live here and be part of this community.

The last thing I want to say, besides thank you for this, for giving me this opportunity, is, I really am tired of talking about deficits.

When people talk about autism, they always talk about deficits, what people can't do. But I like to point out, there's plenty more things that I can't do than I can do and nobody talks about them. Nobody says Peter can't fly a plane or can't juggle; I talk about the things that I can do.

One thing I do know is people with autism can grow up to have adult lives, where they are included, where they are happy, where they have friends, where they're your neighbors, where they are an active part of your community, and they have lives of competence, dignity, and quality. I want to thank you for being part of that process for all the people with autism in Bergen County, so I want to thank you on behalf of EPIC School.

MS. WILDONER: Good afternoon.

1 | MS. YANKOW: Good afternoon, everybody.

Since all of you are animal lovers, I'm going to share a quick feel good story, before I talk about animal cruelty.

into the shelter in January as a stray. Very difficult dog. She kenneled so badly she hurt herself in the kennel, and she didn't like other dogs. So, my staff and all the wonderful people that work at the shelter, we would take turns bringing her into our office. She'd stay in the animal control trailers, because we have an officer on duty 24/7. She lived in the animal control trailer overnight. When we were out of the office, she'd go in a crate, but we were very frustrated and didn't know where to take this dog. No one wanted to adopt her.

So, last week, a couple of our great volunteers, who you honored last week, did a video, we blasted it all over Facebook last week.

Lo and behold yesterday, the family that lost her in January showed up at the shelter because they saw the video. They thought she was gone forever, and it was a big reunite. We didn't give up on her. They came, they had a little baby, and it was like the nicest thing. So I just wanted

1 | to share that with you.

FREEHOLDER AMOROSO: That's so good.

MS. YANKOW: Now, on to animal control.

As some of you know, some of you may not know, this is going to be a year of great change for animal cruelty in the State of New Jersey. The Governor passed S-3558 in January, it abolishes over this year the state SPCA completely. It's not an organization that's going to be around anymore.

The good news is that the impact on Bergen County in this mishmosh of nobody really knowing what they're going to be doing and moving forward across the entire state, this is probably going to be fine in Bergen County.

I brought Chief Wildoner with me.

She's going to say some words. She's the Chief of the Bergen County SPCA, which is going to turn into the Bergen County Animal Cruelty Task Force.

Roni and I have worked together over the past five years on animal cruelty cases in Bergen County. We, as the Bergen County shelter, cross all county lines to assist them when we're called. This is not a contractual obligation, this is a county obligation and a humane and an animal rights obligation. So we handle animal cruelty over the

```
entire county with Roni and her group. And Bergen
1
    County SPCA, soon to be the task force, is
2
    100 percent volunteer organization, and I don't think
4
    a lot of people realize that. And most of our calls
5
    come in at midnight on Sunday. You know, I'm just
    saying, we do hoarding cases. One of the big things
6
    Roni and I work very closely on is educating people;
    not all the animals that come in through this process
9
    are the result of misdirected abuse, a lot of them
10
    are an educational process, meaning people just don't
11
    know any better. And I've actually had people that
    we convicted in court, that they came to the shelter

    and worked with me so that they could understand

    better what we do. We try to educate people. Yes,

    we do see deranged animal cruelty, that's a whole

    different story, but a lot of it is not that. And I
    think, you know, a lot of people don't realize that a

CHIEF WILDONER: We are a task force.

We have been with the Prosecutor's Office for the last 12 years, but we've been operating as the Bergen County SPCA, which we will continue to do so, but we are now completely under the county jurisdiction. will continue to enforce the Title IV the same way we did before. We will be available to any municipality that needs us, although, with the new law, each municipality will have to appoint a humane law enforcement officer. It will be a municipal humane law enforcement officer. They'll have to go through all of the training that we have, and they can, if they choose to, do their animal cruelty investigations in their municipalities. We will assist them any way we can, and if it's something that's out of their comfort zone, we have a lot more experience. Last year alone in Bergen County, we responded to and investigated over 400 cases of animal cruelty and abuse and neglect. A lot of our clients have mental health issues, financial issues, other criminality is involved. We deal with the links with domestic violence. So it's all interconnected. Even though it seems like it's cut and dry, food, water, shelter, not everybody can comply with the needs, because they don't have the means, quite often. So for us to write summonses, it

doesn't always solve the problem. If you write somebody a summons and they can't pay it, they still can't take the dog to the vet, it's not going to help. So we work closely with the clients, we work closely with the shelter, with animal control.

The case we had last year in Garfield where we ended up with all those puppies, it was a nightmare. It ended up being completely out of what we thought it was going to be, people selling puppies in a parking lot. The puppies were imported, underage, not vaccinated, from Columbia. All fictitious paperwork. So it became a bigger problem than just an animal cruelty problem. It was multi-country, USDA involved, the Centers for Disease Control, medical issues in all of these animals that had to be addressed, foster homes for all of these puppies. With Deb's help, we were able to get them all into foster homes. They all were adopted eventually. It was logistically just crazy. paperwork would have spread out everywhere in here, trying to figure out which puppy was which and who has medical issues. I mean, one puppy no longer has the use of his legs because these puppies are puppy mill puppies, but they're coming out of another country. So we're addressing the puppy mills in the

On behalf of our foundation, I thank the Board of Chosen Freeholders for inviting us here today to really allow a continual discussion and exposure about autism and the critical needs and services that we have at all stages of an individual's life, whether it be early intervention services, school services ages 3-21, adult services and resident services. So thanks so much for having me.
