Health Fact Corner

Did you know the Merriam-Webster Dictionary defines insecticide as "an agent that destroys insects." So where did this word come from?



The use of the English word "insect" was

recorded in 1601. It comes from the Latin *insectum*, the neuter form of *insectus*. The other part of the word "cide" comes from Middle French, from Latin *cida*, from caedere to cut or kill. Even words and their definitions have histories.

There are over 2 thousand insecticide products registered for *outdoor* residential use by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, Office of Pesticide Programs. In addition, over 4 thousand insecticide products are registered for *indoor* residential use.

Be sure to follow the safety guidelines when using any type of insecticide.

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MAY IS LYME DISEASE AWARENESS MONTH!

Summer is coming, but so are the ticks! Lyme disease, the most commonly reported tick-borne disease in the United States, has become an important public health problem. New Jersey consistently ranks among the states reporting the most cases. Education about ticks and personal precautions can play an important role in prevention and early recognition. Utilize the videos from the Resource Center to help students become aware of Lyme disease.
