Zoo Camp is a week long 1/2 day program that the Education Department at the Bergen County Zoo offers county residents and zoo members. It runs from 9am—1pm an children ages 5 to 15years old can apply. Zoo Camp runs from the end of June to the beginning of August. Campers are organized into four groups (depending on their age).

During their week at camp, children will to tour the zoo and learn about the animals environment, meet animals up close (in a classroom setting) and participate in activities.

The brochure and application is posted on both the Bergen County Zoo's official webpage

as well as Facebook/Twitter Applications are due back by March 15th. Once the deadline has passed, the children are selected via a lottery system

There are four groups in our program: Lambs, Hawks, Gators, Condors and Jr. Zookeepers. The camp runs Monday—Friday (9am—1pm). There is a fee of \$150 for the week which includes a zoo camp t-shirt.

S P O T L I G H T A N I M A L : G R E A T E R R H E A

The Greater Rhea is the third largest bird in the world. These flightless birds are native to South America. Due to their large size and lack of a keel base is the reason that they do not fly.

A rhea's coloring is typically a soft gray/brown with white under the wings, Males have a black bib and collar at the base of their

neck and are slightly larger than the females.

A rhea's diet consists of grasses and plants as well as insects. the Rhea's at the zoo receive chicken pellets, lettuce, apples and oyster shells (provide calcium).

Rheas typically breed from September to December. The breeding male will display for the females by

fanning their feathers and escorting the females . A female lays anywhere from 10–20 eggs, which are then incubated by the male for 35–40 days.

SPOTLIGHT EMPLOYEE: NANCY MCTAMANEY

When you tell some that you are an animal keeper at a zoo, they always say that it must be a dream job. While working with animals is rewarding, most people do not understand the physical side when working in a zoo. Dealing with the weather (be it a frigid winter day or a sweltering summer), shoveling animal pens, dealing with mosquitos and flies, sometimes the animals do not want to cooperate and scolding the public for feeding the animals potato chip bags. Despite all that, the keepers make the care of the animals their first priority. One such person is Nancy McTamaneY.

Nancy came to the Bergen County Zoo in 2007. She had previously worked at the Trailside Museums & Zoo facility in

Bear Mt, New York as a senior keeper. There Ms. McTamaneY worked with native wildlife and realized this is the career that she wanted to be in. "I've always loved animals since I was a child. It started with turtles and cats and then made its way to larger and exotic animals. I knew this is what I wanted my career to be".

Since coming to the Bergen County Zoo, Nancy dove right into ways she could better take care of the animal collection. Making diets, maintenance of the exhibits, grooming and enrichment, Nancy McTamaneY did it all with dedication and a genuine love for the animals at the zoo.

After some time, Nancy found her niche working within the Animal Welfare Committee. This particular committee looks out for the animal's physical, mental and emotional states over a period of time and ensures that the scales go in the right direction for the animals.

Mc. McTamaneY, along with her fellow committee members, meet once a month to determine that the animals are healthy, well-nourished, safe and able to develop appropriately. In the event that one of these criteria is not met, Ms. McTamaneY proceeds to follow already established protocols to make sure that

the infraction(s) are corrected as soon as possible.

Ever the go-getter, when she found that an animal exhibit needed some TLC, Nancy McTamaneY's would use her maintenance skills to fix or repair the exhibit. Rather than risking the possibility that an animal could injure themselves, Mc. McTamaneY will make sure that the issues are taken care of as soon as possible.

When asked what is the one thing that she would want people to know about her role as an animal keeper, Nancy responded with "I feel very blessed to share my world with such magnificent and beautiful creatures". The Bergen County Zoo is lucky and honored to have her as part of the animal keeper staff.
